Hands-On Learning

ANT 164 — Legends, Lords and Legions: The Prehistory of Great Britain

This course will provide an introduction to the practice of archaeology and to the application of archeological research to the understanding of cultural change in Great Britain from the Ice Age, half a million years ago, until the occupation of England and Scotland by the Roman Empire in 55 BC. A week of classroom instruction will be followed by international travel to Great Britain where you will visit archaeological sites, museums, and participate for two weeks as volunteers with the Vindolanda Archaeological Trust excavation at Hadrian's Wall along the Scottish Border. You will also have the opportunity to experience the unique cultures of England, Scotland and Wales, and to see, first hand, how the expansive prehistory of the British Isles has shaped its modern cultures.

HIS 164 — Castles, Catapults and Crossbows: Defending Medieval England

This course will examine the political and military history of ancient and medieval England by focusing on the groups of people who attacked and occupied England during the period, such as the Romans, Anglo-Saxons, Vikings and Normans. A week of daily lectures at WCC will provide the necessary context for understanding the major political and military events of the period. These lectures will be followed by twelve days of travel throughout England, Scotland and Wales during which time you will visit various historical sites and museums that will provide an opportunity to acquire not only an in-depth understanding of England's complex history, but also an appreciation for the local culture and people that is at the heart of international study and cultural immersion.
